#### Orchestra Notes

The selections for this evening are songs of an era when big bands played for dancers and big band jazz was America's pop music. In the 1930's and 1940's, Benny Goodman, Count Basie, Duke Ellington, Glenn Miller, and their orchestras would pack the crowds into ballrooms, amusement parks and theaters, not only in big cities but in small towns from coast to coast. And if you couldn't make it to places like the Savoy, the Paramount, the Meadowbrook, or the Glen Island Casino, you could catch the excitement from their live radio broadcasts, which could be heard across the country.

Each band had a signature sound: Basie's swinging riffs, Ellington's complex orchestral colors, and Goodman's dramatic precision. Each group had star soloists with their own distinctive styles: Illinois Jacquet's lusty tenor sax, Harry James' soaring trumpet, Gene Krupa's explosive drumming were big attractions in themselves. But the excitement and glamour these bands delivered onstage, with their tuxedo uniforms and emblazoned music stands, masked the hardships of a life spent constantly on the road. Big band swing carried people through the Depression and World War II.
