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CDC COMMUNITY THEATRE -- HISTORY

The Cranford Dramatic Club is the longest continuously producing community theatre in the state of New Jersey. A small group of townspeople wanted to share good theatre with family, friends and neighbors. The first meeting took place in October 1919 and the CDC has produced shows in Cranford every year since then.

The first performance took place in Trinity Episcopal Church's Sherlock Hall. In the 1920s, they moved to the now-defunct Cranford Casino. After World War II, many of the shows were produced at Cranford High School. In the mid 1950s, a group of CDC members decided to build their own theatre. With their names listed on the mortgage guarantee, they began what would become the CDC Theatre, officially opening to the public in 1957.

In 1992, the theatre underwent renovation—a new front facade, new chairs, modernized plumbing and storage areas. In 2003, the lighting system was overhauled, adding a dropped ceiling, lighting instruments, and a computer-operated dimming system. Fundraising efforts allowed for the addition of a handicapped-accessible bathroom in the lobby and a new central air conditioning system installed in 2012.

This season's offerings will include **Sweeney Todd, Aladdin, Speed The Plow and How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying.**

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DIRECTOR'S NOTE

When I first saw *Speed-The-Plow* on Broadway in 1988 I thought "my God I have to do that". My ambivalent relationship with God aside, I was so completely blown away by how the power of Mamet's exact use of language drives the action. Like Shakespeare, all the information needed to perform the piece is written down in the dialogue. Mamet prefers that the actor forget about "emotional preparation" and just get out there and do it. He urges the actor to avoid doing the interpretive job of the playwright. "The actor is on stage to communicate the play to the audience. That is the beginning and the end of his and her job" and "like sports, the study of acting consists in the main of getting out of one's own way."

In *The Presence of the Actor* Joseph Chaikin writes "Acting is a demonstration of the self with or without a disguise. Because we live on a level drastically reduced from what we can imagine, acting promises to represent a dynamic expression of the intense life. It is a way of making testimony to what we have witnessed--a declaration of what we know and what we can imagine. An actor, in expressing himself, touches zones of being which can potentially be recognized by anyone."

Thank you for coming. It is a play that I have ALWAYS wanted to completely devour and experience with an audience. To quote Chaikin again, "the joy in theatre comes through discovery and the capacity to discover. What limits the discoveries a person can make is the idea or image he may come to have of himself. The image can come about through his investment in his own reputation, through an involvement with approval and disapproval, or through feelings of nostalgia stemming from his desire to repeat his first discoveries". Let go and enjoy.
